

# What is **Beyond Granite**?

Beyond Granite is a new initiative that brings to the National Mall exhibitions, performances, and installations that are designed to help create a more inclusive, equitable, and representative commemorative landscape and provide a broader cross-section of American history and culture.

Beyond Granite's goal is to explore new types of storytelling that rely on temporary art forms to create powerful moments in time that will be remembered.

## **Overarching Questions**

What have we learned from the pilot of *Beyond Granite* that can:

- inform NCPC's policies and practices regarding future commemoration?
- provide "proof of concept" to create a long-term sustainable program at the Trust for the National Mall?

#### Who is involved?

**Beyond Granite** is a partnership among the Trust for the National Mall, the National Capital Planning Commission, and the National Park Service.

Beyond Granite is funded by the Mellon Foundation's Monuments Project.


The project's 2023 pilot exhibition, *Beyond Granite: Pulling Together*, is curated by Paul Farber and Salamishah Tillet for Monument Lab.

Justice & Sustainability Associates are supporting District-based engagement to help shape future iterations. Dr. Elizabeth Morton will produce a Key Findings Report based on research and evaluation work throughout the project.

## Beyond Granite as a Curated Exhibition

Beyond Granite: Pulling Together is the pilot exhibition of the Beyond Granite initiative.

The exhibition is an <u>experiment</u> and <u>one</u> <u>approach</u> to adding stories on the National Mall, featuring one set of stories. The exhibition will feature special works of art, performances, and programs on the National Mall in late summer 2023.



Its central question:

What stories remain untold on the National Mall?


## **Long-Term Vision**

Pulling Together, as a pilot, illustrates one approach and one set of underrepresented themes. This sets the stage for an ongoing program to elevate untold stories and the possibilities are limitless – including the nation's historic achievements in science, technology, the arts, and exploration.

What we learn from *Pulling Together* can help inform how *Beyond Granite* evolves as a lasting program, sharing more American stories.

#### **Selection Process for Artists and Themes**

#### **Engage**

The Trust for the National Mall invited Monument Lab to curate the pilot exhibition for the *Beyond Granite* initiative.

#### Research

Monument Lab gathered curatorial research on the history of the National Mall. Under the guidance of co-curators Paul Farber and Salamishah Tillet, a title and theme were selected for the pilot exhibition.

#### Curate

Six artists were invited to participate in the pilot exhibition and create proposals for projects that respond to "What stories remain untold on the National Mall?" Each invited artist was selected by a curatorial process for their varied approaches to monuments, commemoration, and public memory.

#### Guide

Trust for the National Mall, the National Park Service, the National Capital Planning Commission, and Monument Lab worked with a 12-person Curatorial Advisory Board to review the artists' fully developed proposals.

# **Inspiration –** Beyond Granite: Pulling Together

designed by Monument Lab; curated by Paul Farber and Salamishah Tillet



Inspired by **Marian Anderson**'s 1939 Easter Sunday performance on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial, which remains monumental in public memory.

At the time, educator and civil rights activist **Mary McLeod Bethune** remarked that the performance,

"told a story of hope for tomorrow—a story of triumph—a story of *pulling together*, a story of splendor and real democracy."

he/him Born in Baltimore, MD Based in Brooklyn, NY



he/him Born in East Orange, NJ Based in Charlottesville, VA




